ASSIGNMENTS THAT DEMONSTRATE CRITICAL THINKING:

Topics of research papers will require synthesis of information from a variety of sources as well as critical analysis of "facts". Students will be required to evaluate data, draw conclusions, and field questions. Much work will be done in cooperative learning groups that re-

quire the skills of critical argument.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION:

Lecture, discussion, films, guest speakers, group work, field trips.

METHODS OF EVALUATION:

1. Skill demonstration: in-class group work/projects (approximately 20%) 2. Percentage of grade applied to two exams, a midterm and a final (approximately 40%) 3. Three papers on specific topics (approximately 20%)
