President's Report

REPORT FROM SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT KARAS

EXEMPLARY DUAL ENROLLMENT AWARDEE

Mendocino High School (MHS) received an Exemplary Dual Enrollment Awardee. MHS is one of nine high schools statewide to receive this award. We are proud to partner with our K-12 districts to offer opportunities to students to support their educational journey.

The Dual Enrollment Award committee is comprised of representatives from the California Coalition of Early and Middle College (CCEMC), Career Ladders Project (CLP), the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO), the California Department of Education (CDE), and dual enrollment practitioners from secondary and postsecondary institutions.

GUARANTEED ADMISSIONS TO SSU

In our efforts to strengthen pathways and partnership with our regional universities, I was able to meet with the new Sonoma State University President Lee in Fall 2022 to discuss options to strengthen our long-standing partnerships with SSU. The Mendocino College team, including Vice President Velasco and Transfer Counselor Osea, worked quickly and diligently to formalize new partnerships with SSU.

Mendocino College students will have guaranteed admissions to Sonoma State University. This applies to impacted majors (Nursing, Psychology, Sociology, and Criminal Justice) as well.

I want to thank SSU President Lee for approving four transfer scholarships to Mendocino College students. The Presidential Scholarships are \$2,000 per student.

Below are the elements of guaranteed admissions.

- Ensure that all students complete A1 (speech), A2 (English composition), A3 (critical thinking) and B4 (GE Math) with a C- or better, a 2.0 minimum grade point average and 60 transferable units with 30 of those units being general education courses with a minimum grade point average of 2.0 for non-impacted majors.
- Utilize ADT/pathway plans.
- Applicants must submit a Cal State Apply Application to SSU and pay the application fee by the application deadline.
- Students must be in good standing in the Spring term prior to their admissions term at SSU.
- Applicants that apply within the first two weeks of October will be prioritized and provided early admissions with an invitation to celebrate and receive their certificate of admissions at SSU's Preview Day in late October.

TEACHERS ON TEACHING

On Saturday March 4th, the Guided Pathways Foundation Skills Working Group hosted the first post-Covid Teachers on Teaching Conference. Despite the rain, it was a successful and enjoyable gathering of local educators. This (usually) annual gathering brings together community college faculty with K12 educators to discuss common experiences of teaching and learning. This year the theme was Teaching with Compassion. 65 registrants attended both in person and via Zoom and heard presentations on the racial trauma experienced by our students, collaborations between tribal education directors and the K12 system, innovations at South Valley High School, and ways to engage compassionately with students in the classroom.

NATIVE LEARNING SYMPOSIUM

On Friday March 10th, the college hosted the first panel in the Native Learning Symposium series. Funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the symposium aims to educate college faculty and staff, local community members, and K12 partners about the tribes in our district so that we can better serve our native students. The theme of the first panel was Sovereignty and featured Batsulwin Brown, a cultural practitioner and member of Elem Indian Colony; Nikcole Whipple who is a member of Round Valley Indian Tribes as well as a Mendocino College outreach specialist and adjunct instructor; and Debra Ramirez, the Chairwoman of the Little River Band of Pomo Indians. The panelists explained the concept of tribal sovereignty in context of their local histories and personal experiences. The presentations were both moving and intellectually engaging. 25 people attended in person and 70 via zoom. The theme of the next panel is Education and it will take place on April 21st at the Lake Center.
