
COLLEGE ANNOUNCES THE PURCHASE OF PROPERTY FOR FUTURE STUDENT HOUSING

Ukiah, CA – Mendocino College is pleased to announce the purchase of a property at the corner of Perkins and Main Streets in downtown Ukiah, marking the first phase of a multi-year initiative to develop future student housing. This project aims to increase the availability of affordable housing for students and support the local community.

The acquisition of this property is made possible through the generous support from the Mendocino College Foundation and its dedicated donors. The Foundation provided the funding to purchase the property from Redwood Credit Union, and will continue to support the project with additional multi-million dollar contributions for the construction phase. The Foundation has a long-standing commitment to stewarding funds responsibly to support the long-term needs of students, and this project is a testament to its role as a trusted donor partner.

"The Mendocino College Foundation is dedicated to ensuring that donor dollars are used effectively to support the long-term needs of our students," said Julie McGovern, Executive Director of the Mendocino College Foundation. "This project is a perfect example of how we can make a lasting impact on our students' lives and the community."

Student housing at California community colleges offers several benefits, including improved academic performance, stability, and addressing broader housing shortages. Studies show that students who live near campus tend to have higher GPAs and are more likely to graduate. Affordable student housing provides stability, allowing students to focus on their education without the stress of housing insecurity. By offering student housing, community colleges



help address broader housing shortages in their communities, contributing to socioeconomic mobility.

Mendocino-Lake Community College District has been investigating options to construct student housing since 2018. In 2022, we received an affordable housing planning grant, part of SB 196, from the California Department of Finance. A student housing feasibility study was completed in 2022-2023, which included a survey of currently enrolled students. Key findings of the survey were:

- **97% of students** think student housing would be important for retention and recruitment.
- **44% of students** currently enrolled less than full-time would enroll full-time if Ukiah offered student housing.
- **Over 8% of students** are housing insecure, including homelessness, inability to pay rent or utilities, frequent moves, or residing in unsafe conditions.

- There is an **acute shortage of rentals in Ukiah**, with rental vacancy rates at 2.8%.
- **75% of housing units** in unincorporated Mendocino County are single-family (detached), while only 3% are multi-family (2-4 units) and 3% are multi-family (5+ units).

"We conducted extensive studies to identify the housing needs of our students and determined that a downtown Ukiah location was the best option," said Tim Karas, President/Superintendent of Mendocino College. "This particular location will provide students with access to downtown services as well as easy transportation to the college campus."

In July 2023, a competitive grant application was submitted to the California Community College Chancellor's Office to fund a \$54M 110-bed student housing project in Ukiah. Although our project was not funded in the 2024/2025 California State Budget, we remain committed to making progress. A historic milestone was achieved in February 2025 with the Mendocino College Foundation purchasing a parcel of land for future student housing. With this critical step, we can move forward to investigate all funding options available to move the project forward.

We are excited to take this important step towards addressing the housing needs of our students," said Rose Bell, Director of Communications at Mendocino College. "We are committed to being a good community partner and will keep the community informed throughout the project's development."

We are proactively collaborating with the City of Ukiah to find effective parking solutions, and address any concerns about high-density housing downtown. We are committed to transparency and want to set realistic expectations: construction is anticipated to begin in a few years as we continue to secure the necessary funding for the project.

Mendocino College is dedicated to maintaining open communication with the community and ensuring that this project benefits both students and local residents. We look forward to a time when our student housing residents will bring vibrancy to the city core, support local businesses by shopping at nearby stores, dining at cafes and restaurants, and utilizing services within walking distance from their housing. As students pursue their education, they will contribute to the overall strength and vitality of our county.

FIRST AMENDMENT PROTECTIONS

You may be seeing free speech activities on campus. This information is intended to help educate and inform our campus community about the public's right to have a free speech space on campus and what is or isn't allowed.

What's Protected

The First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution safeguards speech and expressive conduct from government censorship based on content. Examples include:

- Distributing information and leaflets
- Displaying photographs
- Holding up signs (restrictions on content or size can amount to censorship)
- Giving speeches
- Burning a flag in protest
- Dancing

There are very limited exceptions to this protection. As part of the government, Mendocino-Lake Community College District cannot censor speech based on its content. For more detailed information, please refer to Board Policy 3900 and Administrative Procedure 3900.1.

A public college cannot allow some groups to set up on campus and not others based on their message. The First Amendment protects speech, no matter how offensive some may consider the content. An open society depends on educated citizens and the entire enterprise of education, and this country is founded on the principle of free speech.

Use of Areas Open to Expressive Activities

The use of areas open to expressive activities is subject to the following guidelines:

- No person using the areas shall touch, strike, or physically impede the progress of passersby, except for incidental or accidental contact or contact initiated by the passerby.
- Persons using the areas shall not use any means of amplification that creates noise or diversion that disturbs the orderly conduct of the campus or classes taking place at that time.
- Persons using the areas reserved for expressive activities shall not disrupt the orderly operation of the college.

Both the California Constitution and the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution offer strong free speech protections—even for speech that is unpopular, controversial, political, or deeply offensive.

Counter-Protesting and Heckler's Veto

A counter-protester may not lawfully silence or substantially disrupt another person's protected speech. One does not have the right to a "Heckler's Veto" by, for example, blocking access to an event featuring a controversial speaker or chanting over the remarks of that speaker.

Anyone can exercise their First Amendment rights, including our employees on their own time. However, employees may not counter-protest as representatives of the district and should make clear that they are acting as private citizens when engaging in counter-protest activities. Some free speech groups, particularly those sharing intentionally provocative material, aim to incite strong reactions to gain media coverage and potentially file lawsuits.

If your goal is to reduce this type of behavior on our campuses, the best course of action is simply to ignore them.

Free Speech Zone

The District has designated the following areas as reserved for expressive activities that do not violate District policy and which are lawful:

- At the **Ukiah Campus**, the designated free speech assembly area is at the south end of Pomo Plaza in the area between the cement benches.
- At the **Lake Center**, the designated free speech assembly area is the western quad area and a minimum of 15 feet from any doorway.
- At the **North County Center**, the designated free speech assembly area is the paved patio area and a minimum of 15 feet from any doorway.
- At the **Coast Center**, the designated free speech assembly area is the courtyard area and a minimum of 15 feet from the doorway.

These areas are chosen so as to provide visibility and allow communications to a large number of students, administrators, faculty, and others walking or traveling on campus but also so as not to disrupt educational and other activities of the District on behalf of students.

If someone is exercising free speech outside of these zones, you may direct them to the correct zone, or notify your manager or the Public Information Office.





Posters should be set up in the Student Center (Lowery Building) by noon on 4/22 or dropped off at the Library prior to this date. Voting will occur in the Lowery Center from 4/18-4/22 (please vote for your favorite!), with winners announced by the next week.


