FEDERAL GOVERNMENT UPDATES

I am writing to provide important updates on several topics that have been raised recently, including federal government changes. My goal is to keep you informed, mitigate any anxiety, and ensure transparency.

MLCCD programs and practices comply with federal laws, California codes and regulations, and the Constitutions of the United States and California. We will continue to uphold our Mission, Vision, and Values.

President Trump signed an Executive Order targeting federally recognized institutional accreditors. ACCJC, our regional accrediting agency, plays a vital role in channeling Pell Grants, student loans, and research funding to eligible institutions. ACCJC accreditation ensures institutions meet rigorous academic standards and protects students and taxpayers from fraud and low-quality education.

I want to make you aware of a recent federal court ruling that has immediate implications for the Department of Education's recent actions related to DEI. A federal judge in Maryland paused enforcement of the Department's February "Dear Colleague" letter, which warned that federal funding could be withheld from schools found to be engaged in discriminatory practices under Title VI. In the injunction, the judge noted the lack of formal process behind the letter's release and warned that it could have a chilling effect on free and open discourse within schools.

On April 25, the Associated Press reported the federal government is reversing the termination of legal status for international students after many filed court challenges around the U.S., a government lawyer said. The lawyer read a statement in federal court in Oakland that said ICE was manually restoring the student status for people whose records were terminated in recent weeks. A similar statement was read by a government attorney in a separate case in Washington on Friday. The lawyer said it would apply to all students in the same situation, not just those who had filed lawsuits. ~ Tim Karas, President

MENDOCINO COLLEGE AG STUDENTS ECOLOGICAL RESTORATION LIVING LAB

Mendocino College Agricultural students have been gaining hands-on ecological restoration skills at the College's new emergency access road in Ukiah. The milelong access road, completed last year in collaboration with Granite Construction and the Mendocino College Foundation, was a resiliency project to provide secondary egress in and out of campus in case of emergency. As a condition of federal and state construction permits, the College is required to plant and maintain over 30,000 native grasses, shrubs, and trees. These plantings will help both re-establish and increase wetland areas and habitat that were disturbed by construction activities.

Mendocino College Agricultural Studies professor Kurt Voight and Director of Facilities Planning, Operations & Sustainability, MacAdam Lojowsky, saw an opportunity for collaboration. "I saw 30,000 plants that needed to get irrigated and put in the ground before April and knew we needed help," said Lojowsky. "I asked Kurt if he thought his students would be interested in being a part of it. His immediate answer was 'absolutely!"

With the remediation consulting by Ukiah-based North Coast Regional Management, Mendocino College maintenance and grounds staff laid thousands of feet of irrigation to ensure that these plants establish and survive. Ag students had the opportunity to learn about large-scale Our Landscape Construction class is hard at work building a brand-new kiwi arbor in the Mendocino College gardens, designed by a student and built entirely by students. This rebuild replaces an ageing structure that has stood for years, and it's just one example of what handson education looks like in action.

irrigation design and different strategies to water this vast number of plants. In addition to specific planting specifications, many of the shrubs and trees also need protective cages to assist in their establishment. All of these aspects were incorporated in this living lab lesson. Working under the directives of actual permits provides students with valuable lessons, explains Professor Voight, "It's great real-world experience on a professional jobsite to be able to work with other students on a common goal. And, it's doing something good for the school. It's hard work-being out there, digging holes, but the students had a lot of fun, I had a lot of fun today."

Once all 31,905 grasses, shrubs, and trees are in the ground, Mendocino College will need to prepare and submit annual reports each year for the next five years with an identified survival threshold of 80% of the plants. Both Voight and Lojowsky see opportunities for future collaboration on this project. *Photos on next page...*

COUNSELING UPDATE

The Eagle Connect software is wrapping up its first year of accepting early alert flags, referrals, and sending kudos to students. We are improving the practices across the college and integrating them into new department workflows to help support student success. The next big project is to transition our counseling appointments to using the Eagle Connect (online) scheduling system in a scaffolded approach. Our Disability Resource Services and Veteran's Counselors will use it this June, EOPS/CARE/NextUp and CalWORKs will begin in the Fall, and all other departments will use it in the following Spring 2026. This approach will help us to fine tune it as we roll out the features.

PRIDE PROGRAM

On April 15-16, 2025, the Pride Program hosted the CCC's 7th Annual LGBTQ+ Virtual Summit. The summit offered the opportunity for students, faculty, classified professionals, and administrators to come together, learn, share innovative ideas, and develop strategies to improve campus programs and student support services. Collectively, Mendocino College had over 60+ attendees. Through dynamic trainings, inspiring speakers, and student testimonials, we explored how to transform our institutions and make lasting structural changes to better serve LGBTQ+ students across CCC campuses.

PHISHING: DON'T TAKE THE BAIT

Phishing attacks are one of the most common and dangerous threats in today's digital world. Whether you're at home, at work, or browsing the web on your phone, phishing can strike at any moment—and often when you least expect it.

What Is Phishing?

Phishing is a type of cyberattack where criminals impersonate legitimate sources to trick you into revealing sensitive information such as passwords, credit card numbers, or personal data. These attacks often come through:

- Email: Messages that appear to come from trusted sources like banks, tech companies, or even coworkers.
- Websites: Fake pages that mimic real ones, such as login screens for email or online stores, are designed to steal your credentials. Scammers often try to mimic the IT Department. Always double-check!
- Text messages or phone calls: These methods, known as "smishing" and "vishing," are also used to lure unsuspecting victims.

Common Red Flags

Be on the lookout for these signs of a phishing attempt:

- Unexpected or suspicious links
- Poor grammar, typos, or generic greetings like, "Dear user"
- ✓ Urgent or threatening language (e.g., "Your account will be locked!", **ACTION REQUIRED**)
- Requests for sensitive information, especially through email
- ✓ Slightly misspelled URLs or web addresses that don't look quite right

How to Protect Yourself

- Always verify: If something seems off, contact the company or person directly using a trusted method.
- **Hover before you click:** Hovering over a link often reveals its true destination.
- Use multi-factor authentication (MFA): This adds an extra layer of security even if your password is compromised.
- **Stay informed:** Phishing tactics continue to evolve. Being aware is a strong first line of defense.
- **Install updates:** Keeping your software up to date helps protect you from known vulnerabilities.

Final Thought

Phishing thrives on distraction and urgency—two things we all experience daily. Taking a few moments to pause, verify, and think before clicking can make all the difference. When in doubt, don't click and report the message to your IT or security team.

NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENT SUCCESS & SUPPORT PROGRAM (NASSSP) UPDATE

The Native American Student Success & Support Program (NASSSP) funds were received in Fall 2023. This program is intended to strengthen pathways to and through the College for Native American students, ensure their educational success, develop leaders, and increase the number of NA mentors. By the end of that semester, we hired a Student Retention Specialist and a Program Manager.

Student-based Goals: **a).** Increase our student transfer rate to CSU or UC systems; **b).** Generate higher persistence rates; **c).** Develop pathways toward leadership roles; **d).** Create student mentorship roles; **e).** Maintain connection and outreach with K-12 students; and, **f).** Create a cohort approach and foster a sense of belonging.


- **Data Collection:** Improved the way Native American student data is gathered/reviewed. This has improved student in-reach opportunities.
- Community Connection: Engaged with tribal communities for programs and activities to build a sense of belonging at an earlier age for students.
- Student Leaders: The NASSSP Center has hired student mentors in alignment with the intent to increase leadership opportunities. The center has supported the student club's advocacy efforts on campus, helping them navigate the college's processes. Current Student Body President and Student Trustee are Native American.
- **Pomo Pathway:** Maintained support for the Pomo Pathway cohort to encourage success in the first year of college, which includes the creation of study groups.
- **K-12 Student Support:** Staff have led the Native American Student Enrichment Program, which introduces Native American students from 5th-12th grade to the college campus and courses. Also, the team have joined outreach efforts.
- **Utilization of EagleConnect:** Embraced the use of this tool to better connect with students.

Challenges: The amount of resources it takes to deliver the quality and wraparound services from the local communities can be a challenge. Also, the team have been asked to create or maintain events or strategies which are impractical.

Highlights: The most recent number of Native American students enrolled actively Mendocino college is 411 students, higher than our most recently reported number of 379 Native (2023/2024).American experienced an 11% increase in retention from Fall 2023 to Spring 2024, compared to the previous year. Also, out of 240 continuing Native American students, 119 of them had an education plan. The 50% rate is higher than that of our general student population.



HISPANIC SERVING INSTITUTION GRANT UPDATE

During Fall 2023, Mendocino College received an HSI grant. The grant funds were used to hire four staff members (a coordinator and three Student Retention Specialists) dedicated to supporting student retention efforts, specifically Latinx students.

Student-based Goals: a). Increase the retention/persistence rate of second-year students; **b).** Increase the number of students completing transfer courses; **c).** Increase the award/degree/transfer completion rate of students; and, **d).** Decrease the number of degree/transfer units completed by students. These were some of the activities:

- Education Plans: During the Spring 2024 semester, the Retention team reached 168 first-time students without education plans and provided follow-up support.
- Undeclared Student Contact: During the Fall 2024 semester, a list of undeclared students was identified for follow-up. After reaching out via email, text, and phone, 79 students officially declared a major/area of study.
- Math & English Completion: HSI Retention team reached out to students who had previously failed (less than a C passing grade) their math or English course. Students received "to-do" item and follow-up support through EagleConnect.
- **Re-enrollment Efforts:** A list of unregistered students from Fall 2023 to Spring 2024 was identified. 161 of the 268 students on the list enrolled for the Spring 2024 term and 90 in the Fall 2024 term, supporting retention/persistence efforts.

Professional Development Goals: a). Implement equity-based practices; **b).** Student-facing staff participating in equity-based training facilitated by the Career Ladders Project.

• The Career Ladders Project has facilitated training two times per semester for staff.

Challenges: Thus far, the biggest challenge has been related to the staffing of the HSI Retention Team. Since receiving the funds, we have hired and lost three Retention Specialists. Two to personal reasons and one for a management position at the College.

Highlights: We have seen an improvement in graduation rates for students. For 22/23, the 100% time to graduation rate was at 7%, meanwhile, the 23/24 rate increased to 15%. There was also a similar increase when comparing the 150% time to graduation rate for the two years: for 22/23, this rate was 24%, while the 23/24 rate increased to 31%.

Also, the implementation of EagleConnect, a data management, communication, and referral system, has allowed for more collaboration between departments.

As part of our Alumni Spotlight series, the Mendocino College Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) Office would like to spotlight: **Eduardo Alatorre-Acevedo**. Eduardo's story encourages us to push forward and pursue our passion areas.

Eduardo's Journey within Higher Education

Eduardo describes himself as a non-traditional college student due to the amount of time it took Eduardo to complete his educational goal at Mendocino College. Due to different health-related concerns, it took Eduardo eight (8) years to complete his coursework at Mendocino College. In that time, he completed almost 100 college credits and earned an Associate of Science in Geology and Earth Science.

Initially, though, Eduardo's family pressured him to earn a degree in Engineering, except Eduardo didn't like his engineering or math courses. Eduardo's interests included geology, including astro-geology, and geobiology. And so, Eduardo decided to pursue his passion despite going against what his family wanted him to pursue. Although Eduardo's family initially became upset that he had not decided to pursue an Engineering degree, his parents came around after he shared his passion for geology with them, teaching them the information he was learning in his courses.

Eduardo's passion for Earth Science started at an early age. Even as a kid, Eduardo would read every book he could related to the Earth and astronomy. Later on, in high school, Eduardo began to volunteer at the Taylor Observatory in Kelseyville, where he would share his knowledge and passion with those visiting the observatory.

It was Eduardo's overall curiosity to learn that led him to attend Mendocino College. Eduardo described the process of obtaining his associates as tough. Due to his health issues, Eduardo found himself being placed on academic probation multiple times. But even despite these challenges, Eduardo found people on campus who were willing to support him in his educational journey. As a MESA student, Eduardo utilized the MESA tutors to help him get through some of his tougher science

courses; likewise, Eduardo sought out support from his instructors, including Tim Beck (Physics/Astronomy) and Steve Cardimona (Earth Science). Eduardo also received support from the General Counselor, Alicia Mendoza; Eduardo mentioned how Alicia helped him navigate through all of the academic issues caused by his health issues.

It was due to Eduardo's work and the support he received from the staff at Mendocino College that he was able to graduate and transfer to UC Davis to continue his studies in Earth Science.

Since transferring to UC Davis, Eduardo has graduated with his bachelor's degree in Geology/Earth Science, and has also embarked on a journey to continue his studies at UC Davis, this time pursuing a master's degree.

When speaking about his experience in the master's program, one of the biggest challenges Eduardo identified was the fact that UC Davis, especially the Geology department, was not very diverse. Eduardo shared that it was difficult for him to imagine himself as a scientist when he hadn't seen others like him in those academic fields. Eduardo expressed his feeling of being an impostor and not knowing what to do, saying how no one in his family had gone through these experiences before. Despite this feeling, Eduardo has received support from his advisor/professor, mentioning how his advisor has helped him find his way and helped him feel like a scientist.

This spring, Eduardo will have finished his first year in his master's program, and he is already contemplating continuing into a PhD program in the future.

Eduardo's Inspiration & Advice to Current Mendocino College Students:

Apart from pursuing his passion area, one of the biggest motivators for Eduardo is his parents. Eduardo shared how his parents came to the United States from Mexico in the pursuit of a better life. And in that pursuit, his parents worked endlessly to make ends meet. Eduardo shared how he recalls his dad sometimes working 18-hour days in the field; sometimes Eduardo would join his dad in the field, helping him pick grapes. Growing up, all Eduardo ever wanted was to be able to find a job that would enable him to take care of his parents.

When asked about what advice he had to current students, Eduardo said, "If there is something you find interesting, even if your parents may not find it worth doing, pursue your interests. Pursue your passion areas, because that will make all the difference."

Eduardo also had one last piece of advice, saying, "Seek help when you start noticing a problem". Eduardo acknowledged that for him, seeking help was something that was truly difficult for him to do because he believed that asking for help would make him a failure.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS SUPPORT

Between March 25 and April 24, 2025, Health & Wellness Services supported 26 students across 44 appointments and participated in several outreach events, reaching over 130 college students and 40 high school students.
