However, students transferring to major in engineering, biological science, or a physical science should focus on completing major preparation courses. Cal-GETC might not be necessary to complete before transfer. Students who do not complete the Cal-GETC prior to transfer will need to complete the 7-Course Pattern for UC Admission along with their major preparation courses for admission.
