PRESIDENT'S REPORT





Since the previous **Board** meeting, the college has prepared and began the new academic year. The first two weeks are devoted to welcoming our students campus. Many managers, staff, and faculty volunteer their time at welcome tables, distribute

food, and work departmental info booths during this time. Some people even volunteered to be in the dunk tank.

On August 28th a group from Mendocino College (Faculty, Staff, Managers) received a tour of the new **California Conservation Corps Campus** in Willits. This new campus will replace the existing site on Talmage in

Ukiah. There are approximately 130 beds, recreational center, dining facilities, educational center, and much more. There will be a general public opening later this fall. It is a remarkable facility and there are many connection points between our institutions related to culinary art, construction, fire science, career pathways, and much more. We look forward to strengthening our existing relationship with the corp.

We received good news from our recent graduating cohort of registered nurses. Again, this year our NCLEX pass rate for the Class of 2025 RN Program graduates was 100%. The Mendocino College Foundation raises funds to cover the NCLEX exam fees for students.

COUNSELING

During August, the Counseling Department prioritized expanding student access to counseling services. To ensure greater coverage during highdemand periods, counseling faculty strategically incorporated additional contract days into their annual schedules. This allowed the department to offer three-day-per-week drop-in "express" appointments, with counselors present on campus for each shift to maximize student choice in service modality—face-to-face, Zoom, or phone. These express sessions supported students with lastminute enrollment needs and schedule adjustments, while also improving departmental efficiency. Counselors further engaged in outreach by tabling at the Week of Welcome activities and hosting a dedicated Fall Student Welcome event to connect new and returning students with foundational resources for academic success. Additionally, the department launched Year 2 of the Eagle Connect platform, enhancing our ability to support students through early alerts, referrals, and positive recognition of attendance and performance.

Looking ahead to September, our Transfer Counselor is leading a new workshop series, "Tag You're In Tuesdays," designed to guide students through the UC Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) process and provide timely, support for transfer planning.



VETERANS RESOURCE CENTER

The Veterans Resource Center is staffed Monday-Thursday 9am-1pm. We are currently refreshing the technology and reorganizing the space. We will be offering weekly Mental Health and Wellness time as well as Monthly visits from EDD to share resources with students.



HEALTH AND WELLNESS

HISTORY BEHIND HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

The observance began in 1968 as a week-long celebration under President Lyndon B. Johnson and was expanded to a full month in 1988 by President Ronald Reagan. It was officially enacted into law on August 17, 1988.

September 15 marks the independence anniversaries of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, with Mexico and Chile following on September 16 and September 18.

This month is a time to reflect on the diverse cultural heritage that enriches our communities and to recognize the lasting impact of Hispanic/Latino/x individuals across all areas of American life.



FACULTY IN THE SPOTLIGHT: LECH SLOCINSKI

Chromatic Aberrations | Sept. 5-30th The Corner Gallery, Ukiah

Mendocino College adjunct faculty member Lech Slocinski is currently featured in the September 2025 exhibition at the Corner Gallery in Ukiah, showcasing his latest photographic series titled *Chromatic Aberrations*.

Slocinski teaches DAM 110 – Digital Art & Media (Photoshop) as a dual-enrollment course at Ukiah High School this fall, and returns each spring to lead ART 282 – Introduction to Photography at Mendocino College. He has also taught ART 140 – Art Portfolio as a dual-enrollment offering in previous years.

His current exhibition explores the concept of chromatic aberration—typically considered a flaw in photography—as a source of artistic inspiration. Rather than correcting these imperfections, Slocinski embraces them, using enhanced saturation, skewed hues, exaggerated grain, and contrast to create vivid, expressive images. His work features "perfectly imperfect people, places, animals, plants, and some abstracts,' inviting viewers into a visual journey that celebrates distortion and color as expressive tools.

Faculty and staff are encouraged to visit the show and support Lech's work, which reflects the same creative energy and technical expertise he brings to his students.

The Corner Gallery is located at 201 S. State Street, Ukiah, and is open Tuesday through Saturday, 11 AM-5 PM.

Alumni Spotlight: Vivianna Morfin

As part of our ongoing Alumni Spotlight series, the Mendocino College Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) team is proud to highlight the inspiring journey of **Vivianna Morfin**.

According to the Pew Research Center, only 7% of Hispanic/Latinx individuals in the U.S. hold a master's degree. As of May 2023, Vivianna joined that distinguished group—an achievement that reflects her resilience, determination, and commitment to breaking barriers.

Vivianna's Higher Education Journey

first-generation Latina college Vivianna described her educational journey as both lonely and intimidating. She faced numerous generational and cultural challenges, often navigating college life without role models to guide her through topics like finances. work-life balance, coursework, and career planning. Despite these obstacles, Vivianna was determined to succeed and sought out a sense of community.

She found connection and support by building relationships with other Brown and Black students and students of diverse backgrounds, and gravitating toward instructors who shared similar cultural backgrounds. She appreciated seeing Spanish-language materials and cultural celebrations that reflected her heritage on campus, which helped her feel seen and valued.

Still, the journey was not easy. Vivianna shared that her mental health suffered under the weight of academic and personal pressures. Fortunately, she received support from family, friends, and faculty—especially from instructor **Ginny Buccelli**, who played a pivotal role in Vivianna's success. Ginny not only checked in but also encouraged Vivianna to seek additional support from the **Health and Wellness Office**, a turning point in her college experience.

Academic and Professional Achievements

After graduating from Mendocino College, Vivianna transferred to Sonoma State University, where she earned her **B.A. in Business Administration** in 2019, just two years after she graduated from Mendocino College. She later pursued a **Master's in Social Work** from Fordham Graduate School of Social Service, graduating in 2023.

Her education opened doors to a variety of impactful roles, including:

- Social Worker at the Boys and Girls Club in Santa Rosa
- Foster Care Case Manager
- Children's Therapist & Mental Health Clinician
- Inpatient Social Worker in the ER, OB, ICU, and Medical Surgery departments

Vivianna is also a published author, contributing to *Latinx in Social Work* (Volume 3), and was honored with the **2023 Future of Social Work Award** by the Latino Social Work Coalition. She was featured in the September 2023 edition of **BOLD Journey magazine** for her outstanding contributions to the field.

Words of Wisdom for Current Students

Growing up in a low-income, single-parent household, Vivianna was motivated by a desire to create a better life for herself and her family. She was determined to break the cycle of generational poverty.


Her advice to current students: have fun. College is demanding, but it's important to make time for things that bring you joy. Vivianna shared how her mental health declined during her time in college, and it was her doctor who told her, "The college students who have the most fun are the most successful."

Vivianna also urges students to find their own community. Whether online or in person, connecting with people who understand your experiences can make a world of difference—academically, emotionally, and mentally.
