
PRESIDENT'S REPORT

CAMPAIGN FOR COLLEGE SUCCESS

Mendocino College was recognized by the Campaign for College Success for our high percentage of Latinx students completing a transfer-level math course within one year of their initial enrollment. The three California Community Colleges with the highest percentage are Mendocino College, Coalinga College, and College of the Siskiyous. A total of 40 colleges, out of 116, were recognized for their work to increase Transfer Pathways and Student Success in California.

This work could not have been achieved without the tremendous efforts of our mathematics faculty, tutors, support staff, academic affairs administrators, and many more throughout our district. Since the passage of AB705/1705, the mathematics sequence has undergone enormous changes.



CALFRESH OUTREACH

CalFresh has been working hard on getting application numbers in. In order to reach our students, we created a survey and posted a survey on our social media accounts, and from that survey, we learned what time, what day of the week, and which campus our students need us to run an application assistance workshop. COUNSELING DEPARTMENT


As we enter the 12th week of the semester, the Counseling Department and Retention team have remained actively engaged in supporting students through both proactive and responsive services. Our counselors and retention specialists have jointly fielded and supported 1,520 flags and referrals to date, reflecting ongoing efforts to promote student success and persistence. In addition, there are approximately 65 additional cases currently being assigned and addressed. The volume of outreach and intervention activity underscores department's continued commitment to early and intentional student support as we move into the final weeks of the term.

Looking ahead, the Counseling and Retention teams are planning a joint session in early December to review and align our workflows for each flag and referral type. This collaborative effort will focus on mapping out the timing and intervention strategies used throughout the semester to ensure consistency, improve response efficiency, and strengthen our unified approach to supporting students.

PRIDE EVENT

Our Pride Program at Mendocino College hosted "Conversation with a Leader: Rodney Wilson" on Tuesday, October 21, 2025, from 12:00-1:30 pm. Rodney is the founder of LGBTQ + History Month, and our students and staff particularly appreciated hearing about his personal life and experience. At some point, Mr. Wilson recommended and talked about the book Generation Queer, praising young people for their vision and positive impact on the future. Thanks to the good audio and visual in the room, the virtual aspect of it (on Zoom) wasn't a barrier at all to communicating with each other and with the audience.

DISCOVER THE POWER OF STORYTELLING



GALLERY OPENS NATIVE NOW: K'EDI WADIM

The Mendocino College Gallery proudly presents Native Now: K'edi Wadim—meaning "Walk Well" in the Northern Pomo dialect—a dynamic exhibition celebrating contemporary Native American art. Featuring over 20 artists, including Mendocino College staff and students, the show highlights Indigenous creativity and resilience through painting, photography, beadwork, weaving, basketry, and more.

The exhibition opens with a reception on Thursday, November 20, from 4:30–6:30 PM at the Mendocino College Gallery. Admission is free and open to the public, with light refreshments provided.

The show runs through February 8, 2026, with regular hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays (12:30–3:30 PM) and Wednesdays (10:30 AM–1:30 PM). Visitors can check the website for winter break hours or email gallery@mendocino.edu for appointments.

"This show is a fantastic survey of Native American artists from our local community and beyond. It is multigenerational, featuring heavy hitters like Meyo Marrufo and Corine Pearce alongside young Native students," says Gallery Director Jazzminh Moore. The exhibition was co-juried by Kyle Whiterock (Native American Student Resource Center) and Victoria Ramos (Financial Aid Technician), both of Northern Pomo descent, reflecting a collaborative effort across the College.

Mendocino College proudly supports the largest population of Native American students of any community college in California. 
